#### LORD LLOYD OF BERWICK (1929-2025)

It is with much sadness that we report the passing on 8 December of Baron (Tony) Lloyd of Berwick. He played a small but significant role in the early development of the Vanguard Way in the 1980s by creating a permissive footpath beside his home, Ludlay, a little north of Berwick Station, which made the route more practical for walkers. He has since taken an interest in the VGW and in March 2023 at the age of 94 showed great faith in himself and us by joining the VWA as a life member! Lord Lloyd was a senior judge, being knighted in 1978, becoming a Lord Justice of Appeal, and raised to the House of Lords in 1993 as a 'Law Lord'. *Photo: WP:NFCC#* 



#### WINTER DOWNS 200

The second Winter Downs 200 took place over 96 hours between 11 and 14 December. The 200 miles includes 46 along the Vanguard Way from Oxted Downs to Alfriston so provides substantial promotion for us. According to their website, 47 runners completed the course: the first man in 50 hours 20 minutes and 2 seconds, followed closely by the first woman in 50 hours 52 minutes. The third event is due to take place 10-13 December 2025 and the entry fee is £600! Considering the conditions at this time of year, anyone who completes the course is worthy of our full admiration!

**PLEASE TAKE PART IN THIS SURVEY**. East Sussex County Council is seeking responses to a survey for their Rights of Way Access Plan and is asking for the views of anyone interested. The VGW Route Manager, John Jefkins, is co-ordinating a formal response on behalf of the VWA, but anyone who regularly uses public rights of way in East Sussex is invited to participate. Responses must be received by 14 March, so you have plenty of time. Please <u>click here</u> for more information. One thing in particular to suggest is to do more to remedy stretches of path that are subject to flooding (see below).

# **OTHER TRAIL ASSOCIATIONS 5: THE SHROPSHIRE WAY ASSOCIATION**

The 192-mile Shropshire Way consists of a figure-of-eight route around the county, centred on Shrewsbury. The northern loop of 71 miles goes through Wem, Ellesmere and Llanymynech, with an extension to Whitchurch. The hillier 121-mile southern loop follows the ridges of the Long Mynd and Stiperstones, climbs into the Shropshire Hills AONB, Clee Hills, Wenlock Edge and The Wrekin, and goes through



Bishop's Castle, Clun, Craven Arms, Ludlow, Much Wenlock, Ironbridge and Wellington. The route has been designed to include many youth hostels in the county. The Association was established in 2016 and became a registered charity in June 2021. It does not have an individual membership system but relies on donations from individuals and local businesses, with support from Shropshire Council, Ramblers and the Ramblers Holidays Charitable Trust. #### **CROSSING ROUTES 15: THE WEALDWAY**

The 82-mile Wealdway leads from the Thames at Gravesend to the Sussex coast at Eastbourne, and encounters the VGW no fewer than three times (in the Ashdown Forest, at Tickerage and at Chiddingly) so it would be feasible to switch from one to the other. The Wealdway and VGW may be considered as siblings and friendly rivals, because both routes were established in 1981 and are broadly similar, crossing the North Downs, the Weald, Ashdown Forest and South Downs. The Wealdway passes through or very near to Wrotham Heath, Tonbridge, Speldhurst, Withyham, Blackboys, East Hoathly and Hailsham. An excellent 80page, fully-illustrated guidebook with maps, has been written by VWA member Robert Peel, who has kindly

agreed to offer it for £7.00 (normally £7.50) including postage to VWA members until 28 February. It can be ordered from Kent Ramblers <u>here</u>, mentioning Vanguard Way Association.



### BED & BREAKFAST ALONG THE VGW 2: The Berwick Inn

Ideally located for VGW walkers beside Berwick Station in East Sussex, the Berwick Inn offers comfortable accommodation as well as a welcome pint at the end of Section 8. And if you should happen to be there on a Thursday, you can join the Pie Society, where a free pint is included with your pie. As well as spacious bedrooms, bell tents in the garden provide 'glamping'. The Berwick Inn holds

special memories for members of the Vanguard Rambling Club: back in the 1960s, in the heyday of the great ramblers' excursions, it was called the Fullers Arms, and when a ramble finished there, the landlord would have pints of their special and very strong Merrydown and Bob Luck ciders lined up for speedy consumption before the return train's departure. Many tales could be told of those return journeys – but must wait for another occasion!



**CONGRATULATIONS** to Michael Walker, who completed the Vanguard Way on 22 November, and a little late (!) to Lindsay Bennett, who recently claimed her badge for completing it in 2012 – year of the London Olympics!

**FLOODING** has become an increasing concern in recent years. Two stretches of the VGW in particular are proving very difficult after heavy rain: the River Eden between Haxted and Starborough (Surrey) and especially a stream near Place Farm, southwest of Chiddingly (East Sussex). The VWA is discussing with the highway authorities how the situation might be improved. However, any improvements will be very expensive, so may take some time. Meanwhile, in consultation with the highway authorities and landowners, we are investigating whether we can effect a temporary solution by dumping suitable material onto the affected areas. We've already made some improvements at Place Farm.

FALLEN TREES often block the VGW, especially during the increasingly frequent and violent storms of recent years, and we do our best to get them cleared as soon as possible, usually in association with the highway authorities. On 19 January a large tree fell onto the VGW next to Farleigh Golf Course, almost blocking it. In this case, the combined efforts of our Route Manager John Jefkins and the golf club's ground staff completely cleared the obstruction within a few days. #### OTHER NEW ISSUES ALONG THE VGW

**Fallen fingerpost north of Chelsham Common** (Surrey). A fingerpost that was only erected last summer at a major junction has twice been knocked over by person or persons unknown. So recently John Jefkins (Route Manager) and Dan Hawksworth (pictured, Assistant Route Manager) re-erected and strengthened it using Postcrete, then finished the bag to fix a second post at the top of the hill in Littleheath Woods. *Photo © John Jefkins* 

**Dredging at Alfriston** (East Sussex). The Environment Agency dredged a 1.5 mile stretch of the Cuckmere River near Alfriston in December. This is intended to remove the silt that has been causing severe flooding in and around the village in recent years. Flooding in this area is also caused by a build-up of shingle at the river's mouth, and the EA monitors this and clears it when necessary.

**Seven Sisters National Nature Reserve** (East Sussex). This is the name of a proposed 'super nature reserve' that would include the VGW between Cuckmere Haven and Splash Point (where the VGW drops down onto the Esplanade at Seaford). It would cover a huge area, including the existing Lullington Heath NNR, Eastbourne Downland and Seaford Head. At present, this does not seem to affect the VGW but we shall be keeping a close eye on the proposals.

**Martello Tower, Seaford** (East Sussex). The new café and toilets inside the old toilet block beside the tower are now fully open (see VGW News #3, April 2023), while the popular, existing adjacent refreshment hut beside the beach continues to trade.
